At the beginning of August, St John's Stevensville started delivering a weekly newsletter into the email inboxes of members and friends of our congregation. For the last few weeks, we have been asking, if you wish to receive the weekly eBlast, that you give your contact information to Victoria either by signing the list that is available in the Fellowship Hall or by emailing her at sjsprograms@gmail.com.

When we were thinking of doing this, one of the questions was, "What would we call our weekly, online newsletter?" As you know, our hard copy, quarterly newsletter is titled, "The Good NewsLetter," so we wondered what might we call this new newsletter? I suggested that we call it, "Dear Theophilus," and so, I have been asked to explain why. The author of The Gospel According to Luke and The Acts of The Apostles begins both of those books with the greeting, "Dear Theophilus," and that has always both intrigued me and warmed my soul.

The question has been asked whether Theophilus was the name of an individual or is it a more generic term? Theophilus is a Greek word, often used as a proper name, that derives from two words, "Theos" which we translate as God and, "phileo" which, when used as a verb means to love and, when used as an adjective means beloved or friend of

I have always thought how "Theophilus" was a name that we should all strive to embody. I don't know if the gospelwriter was addressing his books to a particular person or a community of believers but, 2000 years later we are reading them and, they are in a very real way addressed to us. In this way, we are the "Theophilus" of the greeting. We are the beloved of God and we are the community that is called to be lovers of God. We are blessed with the knowledge that our God loves us and wants a deep, intimate relationship with us. We are also blessed with a deep seeded desire to be in relationship with God, to be lovers of God and, we seek ways to both express and live out that love in our lives daily.

The online, eBlast newsletter will keep us informed of what is happening at the church. Through it you will be kept aware of what is happening during worship, opportunities for nurture and study, ways to volunteer and serve and, other news about the church and wider community. <u> June 2023 Habitat Experience – Saugeen First Nations</u>

On June 19 & 20 I led a team of 25 volunteers on a 2-day Habitat for Humanity build in Saugeen First Nation, which included 11 members of St. John's Stevensville United Church. Following a bright & early 4:00am start on the 19th, the church team car-pooled up to the site (about a 4-hour drive). Team members not affiliated with the church, most of whom came from other areas, met us at the build site.

Following our orientation with the team from Habitat Grey Bruce, our enthusiastic team divided up and went to work on 4 houses where construction was underway. Within the first day we were raising walls on three houses, while another team worked on weather-proofing another house that was further along in construction.

After our work day was done on Monday, we shared a meal of pizza and wings in a conference room at the motel where we were staying in Southampton. Following the meal, we had a time of sharing where each participant spoke about their reasons for joining the team, and how they felt the day had gone for them. An important part of processing the build experience!

Tuesday morning we had breakfast at the motel, followed by a return to the build site and another day of highly productive work by our awesome team. Every single team member should be proud of the work we accomplished! While we were at the site, Victoria recorded interviews with the church members who were on the build, and afterward created a great video that tells the story of the build. Along with a selection of photos from the build, it can be accessed on the St. John's Stevensville Facebook page or the church website.

After our build day was over on Tuesday, we all shared a meal at a restaurant in Southampton, before heading off homeward.

It was a wonderful experience, with a great team, and so planning has already begun for a return in 2024 during the days before Indigenous Peoples Day (June 21). If you're interested in coming with us, keep those dates open....and spread the word to friends, family, and colleagues. It's a great way to put Reconciliation into ACTION!



<u>Studying Galatians</u>

So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. If you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise. -Galatians 3: 26-29

On Monday, September 11, we will begin a 4 week Bible Study, examining Paul's Letter to The Galatians. The Letter to The Galatians, it has been argued is one of the first of Paul's letters, dating perhaps as early as 48 CE (the Common Era, also referred to as AD). This predates even the earliest of The Gospels and The Letter to The Galatians gives us a view into the fledgling community of believers in The Way, later to be identified as Christians. In this letter we see the theology of that early community and how that theology developed. We are part of the debate between those who believed that before being baptized into the community of Christ a person had to be circumcised, thereby first becoming a recognized Jew, a descendant of Abraham and those who believed that that was an unnecessary step and an additional burden that could not be justified. This is just one of the topics we will be exploring through the course of our time together.

We will gather at **The Embrace Centre, 14 Jarvis Street, on four consecutive Mondays, (Sept 11, 18, 25 and October 2) from 1:00–2:30**. Of course, the coffee pot and tea kettle will be on and there will be opportunity to chat both before and after the scheduled study time.

Security updates

At a June meeting of the Trustees, I was requested to look into a security system for the church as part of my "tech" responsibilities. Quotes were secured from 4 contractors, and after careful review by select members of Council I was instructed to proceed with Force Security Inc.

They have installed a comprehensive, monitored security system with building security, video monitoring, and building safety (CO and smoke detection). The system includes the ability to turn on perimeter security if anybody is working alone in the building – an important safety measure. The video monitoring includes our Innunguaq (often a source of controversy) and our expensive new church sign, as well as the rest of the church perimeter and all entry points.

By the time this report is printed, I'm anticipating that all church key-holders will have been instructed how to disable the system upon entry and enable it when departing. If anyone has a key to the church but has not yet been instructed how to work the security system, please contact me at your earliest convenience. It is a very simple system to use, so instructions will only take a few minutes.

Trustees Discussions

In our annual report last year, the Trustees of the Embrace Endowment Funds of St. John's Stevensville United Church focused on a possible layout for an expansion of the church building. By 2026 we may be ready to start on building a new wing, possibly dedicated to ministries and services for seniors, as a community service annex to the South Niagara Hospital opening in 2028. Now in an investment portfolio with The United Church of Canada Foundation, under the control of SJSUC Trustees, most of the resources for doing this were provided in his estate by Robert Keys. This was reaffirmed in her will by



his wife, the late Anne Keys, in expectation that members of this church would make contributions to turning their vision into reality, as we did in major renovations completed in 2026, and in opening the Embrace Centre in 2018. This South Niagara Hospital will have a specialization in Wellness in Aging as the first "WELL- Certified" hospital in Canada. As the only church within sight of the hospital, we will also see it from here, redefining our neighbourhood with eventually 10,000 new residents in suburbs between Lion's Creek and Sodom Road. This will be the fasting growing part of Niagara Falls, where several thousand hospital workers and others may live with their families. In addition to serving seniors, we want to be the worship centre for many of our new neighbours. In a similar way, the hospital will feature a nearby Indigenous healing space and garden. Hospital planners have taken note of our welcoming neighbourhood Inukshuk.

In June of the current year the SJSUC Trustees met to do some vision work in reference to their responsibility to facilitate these intentions of the Keys' estate. The Embrace Centre was envisioned by the Keys to minister to greater Fort Erie to the south of us, and it may see some expansion for community outreach, serving both Fort Erie and Ridgeway. The hospital annex, attached to the church, and ministering to the north of us, will have a very different purpose. Sunnybrook Hospital in Toronto has an agreement for out-patient Alzheimer's off-site day care with the nearby Lawrence Park United Church. This is for folks living at home with spouses who need a day or two a week of relief – one of the things we might provide for seniors here, with our volunteers sharing roles with hospital staff. Bob Keys saw such an arrangement for an ailing former business partner in Montreal, where Église Unie St. James United Church had a similar arrangement with Royal Victoria Hospital. As our population ages, this will give us the opportunity to vision.

This event sees close to 1000 children per day, and their families, over a four day period.

These two events provide a wonderful opportunity for St John's Stevensville to be visible in the wider community, sharing our understanding of God and the gospel with those in attendance. It is also an opportunity for members of St John's Stevensville to offer a little of their time and energy for our outreach ministry in a fun and care-free way.
