A lot of Folks ask me what I am studying in my doctoral studies. My courses have concentrated on strategies to sustain and grow ministries, because I believe that a community of faith needs to take seriously their own spiritual growth in order to minister to others. This certainly needs to be in place before a community can attract new membership. My dissertation deals broadly with a further exploration of a link that I believe exists between the images of Jesus Christ that we are drawn towards and the type of Christology we confess. In a narrower sense I am interested in how my thesis assertion is reflected in the United Church of Canada, with the eventual goal of using the research to create a series of discipleship resources.

My biblical starting point uses a question Jesus posed that is recorded (slightly differently) in all three of the synoptic gospels, "Who do you say that I am?". This conversation is recorded in Matthew 16:13-20, Mark 8:27-30, and in Luke 9:18-21. This is followed by my jumping off point from John 1:39-41 where John the Baptist has identified Jesus to his disciples and the disciples are curious and engage Jesus in conversation. Jesus' basic response is to come and see.

Throughout the gospels, Jesus uses a variety of different imagery to make His point for those who are listening and watching. We come to understand the importance Jesus puts on engaging the whole of our being, inviting us to use all of our senses; look and see, those who have ears should hear, taste and see, touch that can heal the sick. And through these experiences we come to a deeper understanding of who Jesus is to us, just as the records of the gospels tell of folks who through those experiences came to a deeper understanding of who Jesus was for them. As a congregation we need to examine such questions to discern how we understand living out our ministry.

Mercy and Grace

The Lord is gracious and full of compassion; slow to anger, and of great mercy. The Lord is good to all: and the tender mercies of YHWH are all over the works of The Lord. (Psalm 145: 8, 9)

During a recent Bible Study the question of mercy and grace was raised. Specifically, what is the difference between the two. God is understood to be both merciful and gracious and often a prayer will begin, "God of Grace and God of Mercy, …." But, often grace and mercy are used interchangeably. However, although grace and mercy are intimately related, they are indeed two different and unique facets of the character of God.

When, while reading scripture we come upon the word "mercy," it is usually a translation of the Greek word *eleos* which can also be translated as good will, pity or compassion. And, when we find the word "grace," it is usually a translation of the Greek word *charis* which can also be translated as favour or loving-kindness. Willmington's Guide to the Bible differentiates between the two terms as follows: *mercy is the act of withholding deserved punishment, while grace is the act of endowing unmerited favour.* So, we can see that grace and mercy are so intimately related that they might be thought of as two sides of the same coin. And yes, that coin is God's love for us.

It is God's grace that encourages us to realize our gifts and emboldens us to use them. As God is the source of all gifts, it is through God's grace that we receive those gifts. They are unearned. It is not through our own merit that we receive them. And of course, the greatest gift is the gift of Jesus Christ AND the faith that is ours to believe. John 3:16 tells us that Jesus is sent into THE WORLD because of God's love for THE WORLD. Jesus is God's gift, given out of God's grace, unearned and, some would say undeserved. But, it is also through God's grace that we have been gifted with a faith that has opened our eyes and our hearts to this truth. And, this faith, this gift of God's grace is also unearned and given freely. *"For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God."* (Ephesians 2:8)

God's mercy is the assurance of God's love even when we failed; even when we have erred; yes, even when we have sinned. God's mercy elevates the one lost sheep; prioritizes the lost coin; and, welcomes home the lost child with loving arms. Rev Cheryl, Victoria and I have started watching a show on TV called The Chosen. It is a dramatization of the life of Jesus and an interweaving of the lives of those around him. One of the aspects of the show that stands out for me as I write this article is how none of those who are "called" to follow Jesus feel themselves worthy to do so and, the storyline points out that they are right ... they are not worthy. But, the story does not end with their unworthiness. By God's mercy, communicated through Jesus, not only do they (we) not receive the punishment they (we) believe they (we) deserve, they are in fact called into communion with Jesus to be purveyors of the Kin-dom of God.

Grace and mercy, mercy and grace ... two sides of the same coin, so intimately connected it is difficult to know which comes first. By God's mercy we are forgiven but, by God's grace we know we are forgiven. By God's grace we are gifted and emboldened to exercise those gifts in the world but, it is God's mercy that releases us from those feelings of unworthiness, freeing us from the bondage of sin and guilt. And both mercy and grace are evidence of the magnitude of God's love, a love that transcends all limitations, even those that we might try to impose on God's love for us.

"Grace, mercy and peace will be with us, from God and from Jesus Christ, in truth and love." (2 John 1: 3) Blessed be! Amen!

trial.


When Rowan Williams, the 104th Archbishop of Canterbury was asked about The Lord's Prayer he said;

"It's completely fresh, it never gets stale because what it's talking about is the human condition in the presence of God. It's about the world we live in and the world God wants us to live in, and I can't imagine anything taking its place. ... Every single bit of The Lord's Prayer is radical because it challenges our assumptions about who we are and who God is and what the world is like. And what it's praying for is the most revolutionary change you can imagine in the world we live in. a change to a situation where all the hungry are fed, to a situation where forgiveness is the first imperative, and all our relationships are transparent to God. And, as people will notice, that's not exactly like the world we inhabit at the moment – it's looking for change from the roots up."

The Lord's Prayer has been with us for generations ... indeed it has been around for two millenia and is one of the gifts of Christianity to the world. It is a prayer at once familiar and brand new. It is radical in its content and revolutionary in its power. It is both comforting and scandalous ...at the same time! During our recent Lenten Bible Study it was suggested that it might be time to do a study of The Lord's Prayer (found at Matthew 6: 9-13 and Luke 11: 2-4). And so, here it is ... a six-week Bible Study of The Lord's Prayer. Starting on Tuesday, May 4th at 2:00 and lasting for six weeks we will explore together the meaning of this very familiar prayer, perhaps seeing it for the first time again. 

Cemetery Update


