Eye of The Believer: Visual Confession Of Christological Faith

Pierre Teilhard de Chardin wrote,

"We are not human beings having a spiritual experience; We are spiritual beings having a human experience."

As many of you know, Rev. Cheryl has recently become the Rev. Dr. Cheryl, having graduated with her Doctorate of Ministry on May 20, 2023. We are all very proud of her!! I'd like to give a special thanks to all of you who came out to the celebration for her, it was wonderful to be surrounded by friends and family on such a wonderful occasion!

In case any of you have forgotten (or never truly understood) what her thesis was about, let me try to recap it for you.

It can be difficult to properly describe who we think Jesus Christ is, but we all live out our faith in the different ways that make the most sense to us. Rev. Cheryl theorized that all those who lived out their faith in similar ways would be drawn to the same images and depictions of Jesus in art. That way, through study, a congregation could be identified by the art style they display and the ways they live out the gospel, which are intricately related. Through the study we discovered that the faithful actions of St. John's Stevensville United Church relate to a piece of art that is inclusive, interactive, and focusing on Jesus himself. Therefore, a proposal has been written to design a sculpture that fits that criteria and can eventually be put on display in front of the building. Below is the official abstract from Rev. Cheryl's dissertation is written below;



How do we inform our experience, bring our humanity more in line with our spirituality. A key medium on the human pursuit of knowledge and self-awareness is art and, specifically visual art. How an individual views, receives and perceives the visual arts serves to shape and form their understanding of the world around them and within them. Nowhere is this more true or profound in our receiving of artistic depictions of episodes from the scriptures of the world, and for the purpose of this paper I am drawing particular attention to artistic depictions of Jesus Christ and how those depictions affect the viewer and, effect change in their living out their Christian faith.

Focussing primarily on three pieces of public art, sculptures that can be encountered in accessible spaces in Toronto Ontario, I will explore how an individual's experience of their encounter impacts their spirituality and their understanding of what it is to be a follower of Christ. The Crucified Woman, Homeless Jesus and, When I Was a Stranger are three specific and, unique depictions of Christ that demand a response from the viewer.

From this study and, working with the participants, I will create a piece of public art that will be housed at St. John's Stevensville United Church that will serve to inform and challenge the viewer to continue their journey towards a deeper and more committed relationship with the Divine.

Our Place in Creation

As I sit down to write this, I have to start by telling you about two interesting emails I received this morning. The first one was from my doctor's office informing me about a new program they are offering called "Forest Therapy". Apparently, a new program to teach the "gentle practice of mindful awareness and connection to nature" thus promoting wellness by attuning my senses, so that I can reconnect with myself and with others. How lovely that my doctor's office is concerned about not just my physical health, but also my mental, emotional, and spiritual well-being! This is a definite departure from my early childhood experiences of the doctor's office that revolved around x-rays, prescriptions, and booster needles.

It used to be only the church that sought to attend to my spiritual and emotional wellbeing. The reason this email struck me so much was because right under that email was one from the denominational office also informing me about an upcoming event, a church webinar was on "How to Develop an Investment Policy Statement". Now, there is nothing wrong with developing investment policies, nor developing statements about such investments, it was just the timing of the two together that struck me funny. The restructuring of our denomination a few years ago moved us to more of a corporate structure, and some days I mourn the loss of our focus on growing disciples of Jesus Christ. Last I checked, the forest therapy course was full, and the policy statement webinar still had spots available.



As a Minister I am always interested in ways to facilitate spiritual growth in our faith community. Ways to help Folks be attentive to the workings of the Holy Spirit, so that we might all grow deeper in our relationship with God.

The other reason why I mention my 'Forest Therapy' email is that I have just arrived home from a day spent checking out walking trails for our summer Prayer Walk series. Sometimes you need to step outside, get some air, and remind yourself who you are, and who God desires you to be. There is value in removing ourselves from our regular environments in order gain renewed perspective about the wondrous gift of God's creation, and our place in that creation. And we plan to facilitate such opportunities this summer over three walks.

Our first walk will take place on Saturday, June 17th at Dufferin Island Park. People can meet the group there at 10am, or join a carpool from the church at 9:30am. We will begin with prayer and then Folks will take time to explore, before meeting up again for a brown-bag picnic lunch. We should be back at the church again by 12:30pm. Dress for the weather, bring sunscreen, water, a journal, and your lunch.

The second excursion will be to Queenston Heights Park on Saturday, July 15th. Again, we will meet up at the church at 9:30 to carpool to the walk site, and stay for lunch. The third prayer walk is set for September 2nd with the location to be announced later. The walks sites were chosen because they have easy trails, clean accessible bathrooms, and picnic tables.


